

Background

- On 1/30/23 near disputed islets, Coast Guard vessels from China and Japan each warned off vessels from the other nation.
- Disputed islets/areas are called the Diaoyu Islands by the Chinese, and the Senkakus by the Japanese.
- These uninhabited islands are administered by the Japanese, and are near shipping lanes, fishing areas, and potential petroleum reserves.
- The islands remain an issue and a point of tension between China and Japan, each claiming ownership and territorial waters. Taiwan also has claims.
